In other news, we are proud to announce that we were successful in a Rolls Royce Wellbeing Grant application. Over the last few years, Rolls Royce has advertised to local schools that they have a wellbeing fund which they can apply for. As I am sure you imagine, lots of schools put forward their applications and Rolls Royce then have the tricky task of deciding which applications were best and how much money they should receive. Expertly supported by one of our kind parents, our bid was chosen and we will be shortly receiving a sum of money which can be used in school to help support the children's mental health – look out in the future for more details. In the last three years, that now brings our successful grant total to £26,000 (Lottery, Tesco etc). Not a bad day's work all in all and we have more plans for grants in the future!

And finally, another big thank you to everyone who has contributed to our 'Personal Care and Beauty Recycling Programme' so far (see page 7 in the newsletter). This is a very exciting opportunity for the school – not only do we help to save the planet and reduce plastics but there is also a good chance we might win a £10,000 play-ground!

What has really helped is a parent dropping off a huge box of used deodorant lids this morning! As it is all measured by weight, this will go a long way towards supporting our cause. Once the national league table is produced and we can track our progress I will let you know. You've got to be in it to win it!

Highlights from this Half Term

Another busy half term: an assembly with Leigh Timmins - world record holder for cycling across Europe, Parent Evenings, World Book Day, Music Celebration Assembly and FS2/KS1 Easter Bonnet Parade are just some of the things we have participated in during the past few weeks.

FS2 enjoyed a trip to Rosliston Forestry Centre where the children learned about hibernation and took part in Teddy's Bushcraft where they we able to toast marshmallows on a campfire. The children were also very excited to take part in the East Bonnet Parade this Thursday, showing off their masterpieces!

Y1 invited their parents to come and join them in some open phonics sessions this half term - we hope you found these useful? The children have also been active, taking part in some Soccerstar taster sessions and searching for the first signs of Spring in our Outdoor Learning Area. We've even been measuring and recording the daily rainfall!

Y2's World War II topic came to a grand finale earlier this week with their VE Day Celebration Party. We hope the parents enjoyed our singing and dancing? In addition to learning our songs and dances for the VE Day Celebration Party, we've also managed to squeeze in some drum workshops and science experiments to establish the difference between handling bread with gloves and handling it with dirty hands. The 'Ancient Egypt' theme continues in **Y3** this half term - the children have been making 'death masks' and moving mummies using pneumatics. This week in RE, we've been looking at the Christian celebration of Easter and making our own decorative crosses.

The highlight of this half term for **Y4** has to be Condover Hall residential! The children had great fun joining in teambuilding activities such as rope climbing, laser conquest and tunnelling. This half term, we've also been coding using 'Scratch', creating our amazing Egyptian newspapers and utilising our outdoor learning area to learn about fairytale settings.

Y5 have been creative this half term, producing some amazing artwork inspired by William Morris and making some felt animals in needlework lessons. The children from Y5/6 also enjoyed a trip to Yorkshire Wildlife Park as part of their 'Planet Earth' topic, where they were able to learn about the different animal habitats.

Y6 have spent 12 weeks of hard work collecting examples of palm oil products. Palm oil is in 50% of all packaged products, including soap, shampoo and food. We have encouraged four major companies to stop using dirty palm oil. An amazing achievement; hopefully more will follow! Also, as part of our ongoing Mental Wellbeing lessons, Year 6 have been discussing negative thoughts that sometimes worry us or get us overthinking. We are exploring ways to think more positively when faced with difficult challenges.
