The game is a visual novel game that includes a storyline about one of the main characters committing suicide, which is depicted in a very graphic scene. It is not intended for children and does include several warnings at the start of the game.

I have spoken to the Professionals Online Safety Helpline seeking advice about this game. They state that across the UK they have heard of no actual

cases where children were using it. The NSPCC have also stated the same. If children in your setting are discussing the game, it does not necessarily mean they are playing it directly. There are numerous videos on YouTube and gaming streaming sites where players are on the game, which may allow children to view the content.



We advise that schools should ensure their filtering systems block the game and provide support to any pupils who have concerns after seeing the content within the game Be mindful of children in your care who may be struggling emotionally and ensure there is care in place for them.

We are keen not to attract attention to the game from children who don't already know about it, therefore we would urge that this information NOT be shared with parents directly or circulated broadly, but on a "need to know" basis.

What if parents ask?

As always we should encourage parents to engage with their child's online life and show an active interest in what they are doing online.

We cant blame a game for poor behaviour, it is a parents responsibility to keep their children safe online and this includes limiting games and

certain websites. The NSPCC'S <u>Net Aware</u> website and <u>Childnet</u> can provide support.
