

Now write an introduction for your report about your chosen mini beast. Think back to the car report we did and what we included. Can you ask any questions to entice the reader? Attract lots of beautiful butterflies to your garden with a DIY butterfly feeder - which can be decorated with beads, sparkles and flowers, and filled with 'nectar' and fruits. 	<p>drops of your chosen food colouring. Pour the liquid mixture into your large bowl and mix together with a spoon. Sprinkle the kitchen counter with flour and lay the dough onto it. Knead it together for a couple of minutes until it feels like a recognisable play dough consistency. If you don't have a spare dish or plate, then an aluminium foil tray or empty tin can will work just as well.</p> <p>What You'll Need:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - An old plate, dish or bowl - Colourful decorations, such as beads, stickers and flowers (fake or real) - String and ribbons - A sponge - Sugar <p>Method:</p> <p>Just like children, butterflies love colour and reflective surfaces - so get creative as a family, decorating your plate or tray with lots of fake flowers, colourful ribbons, stickers and sparkly beads - use whatever you have in the house to make the feeder look fun, bright and beautiful.</p> <p><u>IMPORTANT AN ADULT MUST DO THE FOLLOWING:-</u>Make the butterfly food by mixing 10-parts water to one-part sugar in a pan, heating the mixture until the sugar has fully dissolved, then leave to cool. Soak a brightly coloured sponge in the sugar water (the yellow kitchen sponges are great for this) then place the wet sponge in the centre of the butterfly feeder, along with flowers and leaves from the garden. Find a nice spot outdoors where you can watch the butterflies come to feed - and get the kids to top up the sponge</p>

Remember sketch what you can see, not what you think you can see. Can you shade it in carefully using your pencil? Think about shading in one direction. If you have different graded pencils, think about which would work the best for different areas of your sketch. If not, think about how hard you press on while shading to create dark and light markings.</p>	<p><u>PSHE/Arts</u> Make Your Own Mini Beast or Plant Jigsaw You'll need: a magazine or finished colouring page, glue, cereal box and scissors Use a colouring page, magazine, print a free one from the internet or why not draw your own mini beast or plant? Glue it to a piece of card and trim it so that it's the same size. After, cut up the image and turn it into a jigsaw. If you want to make it trickier, cut it into smaller pieces.
